# Thinking of doing an Internship? Where do you start?

We want your research to have influence and relevance beyond your immediate discipline and this university. To help you with this, the DTC actively encourages 'knowledge exchange', and in particular promotes internships. Since 2011, over 70 ESRC-funded Oxford students have participated in collaborative activities with non-academic partners, and 33 have carried out internships in a wide range of organisations, from the United Nations to Oxfam, from Goldman Sachs to Locus Analytics, from the International Criminal Court to Thames Valley Police, and from the Japanese Ministry for Health, Labour and Welfare to the Scottish Government.

There are three ways you can go about organising a funded internship, which can last up to 3 months.

i) Your own personal or professional contacts and networks, or those generated through your research. To apply for funding to support the additional costs of an internship, and to find out more about our expectations, fill in our internship application form at <u>http://dtc.socsci.ox.ac.uk/current-students/</u> <u>ressource-and-funding-guidelines</u>.

(ii) a bespoke service provided by Oxford's Careers Service, called the Doctoral Internship programme. Their trained advisors can help you identify internship possibilities and facilitate every step, from applications to signing contracts to follow-up. For further information, see the Doctoral Internship Programme website, or contact the Doctoral Internship Programme team at <u>doctoral.internships@careers.ox.ac.uk</u>. They ask you to follow their application process in order to process funding

(iii) nationally advertised internships scheme, such as the Policy Internships organised by the <u>Research Councils</u> themselves. You can apply for these in addition to our own funded internships.

Note: you can only undertake one DTC-supported internship across either the DTC internship support scheme or Social Sciences Doctoral Internship Programme.

### **Interdisciplinary Funding**

The DTC provides funding for interdisciplinary projects - such as workshops, seminars or small conferences (or whatever is specifically covered) – on a rolling basis, and you can apply for funds at any point. Now is the time to plan an event for next year.
